President's Message

The bylaws changes have been finalized! After many months of work, the changes have been approved by the PCOTC membership and the AKC. Thank you so much to the Constitution and Bylaws committee, Lisa McCarthy, chairperson, and the committee members, George Berger, Virginia Hagan, Tom Nardi, and Megan Woods. We appreciate your hard work!

There are two changes that will have an immediate effect on the members:

- 1. We are revising our fiscal year to a calendar year. In order to do this, all membership renewals will be for 1 ½ years, starting in June, 2017, and ending in December, 2018. Volunteer members will need to do 18 volunteer hours during this time period to keep their volunteer status.
- 2. There are now requirements in order to be a member in good standing. Regular and family members must do one of the following:
 - (a) volunteer service to the club (12 hours annually for Regular members and 24 hours per family unit for Family members) during the previous calendar year
- OR (b) take one session of classes during the calendar year
- OR (c) attend three Club meetings, functions, or events

If for some reason, you are unable to fulfill the requirements to remain in good standing, the Board of Directors can waive the requirements on a case-by-case basis.

Our annual awards and election meeting will be held on June 12. Please join us to celebrate our members' accomplishments this year as well as welcome our new Board members!


Agility Tip: Training with One Jump

While an agility course is often made up of 18 to 20 obstacles, a lot of really important foundation skills can be taught in a small space on just one jump. Below are two of my favorite skills to train on one jump. Both exercises are appropriate for dogs and handlers at any skill level. Although these are both foundation exercises, they serve as a good warm up and would be good to try at the practice jump before going into the competition ring.

The first exercise teaches the handler to look for commitment to an obstacle. It will also help strengthen the dog's commitment to an obstacle. The second exercise teaches the dog to follow your handling elements. This will help keep the balance between handler focus and obstacle focus.

Remember, when in doubt reward the dog. Happy training!

The setup will remain the same. Dog placed 10ft away from the jump and reward preplaced one stride beyond where the dog will land over the jump. Stand an arms length away from the wing, but this time look over your left shoulder with your dog side foot (left) back. Release the dog and call him/her to your left side. When they reach your leg, take one step forward with your dog side foot (left) giving the dog permission to go grab its preplaced reward.								70

Get Focused: Deb Jones

PCOTC will be hosting a seminar given by Deb Jones Ph.D. on September 16 & 17. Deb Jones is a psychologist who specializes in learning theory and social behavior. She has taught a variety of psychology courses at Kent State University for the past 20 years. She is also an instructor with the Fenzi Academy and co-author, with Denise Fenzi, of the four-book series Dog Sport Skills.

In addition to teaching, Deb has been training dogs for performance events for the past 25 years and was an innovator in the use of clicker training techniques in dog training. She has owned and worked with a variety of breeds and has earned top-level titles in agility (MACH), rally (RAE), and obedience (UD) competitions.

You cannot teach a dog who does not have focus. If your dog is unfocused, you need to identify the reasons why the dog is not engaged with you. Unfocused dogs may suffer from a lack of clarity, a lack of enthusiasm, a lack of control or a lack of confidence. Come join us in learning to diagnose why dogs do not have focus and to tailor a plan for each individual team to have an engaged and focused dog.

Rally Tip: Signs

Most of my "Rally Tips" come from what's happening in class or at recent trials. This Spring's subject is no exception.

As my students and I were walking the course, tweaking as we went and discussing questions about navigating the various problems the course presented, I found that there were several times when an argument broke out about the design of the signs themselves: "They" should have done this; "they" sometimes put in a stop sign for sit and sometimes don't; "they" mean one

thing in AKC and something else in WCR; "they" didn't make it at all clear what you were supposed to do at this station!

Well, that's all true—or at least arguable. But there really isn't much point in arguing! The exercises called for in some cases are straight-forward and easily represented graphically (left turn, circle right). But as the tasks become more complex, graphic and/or minimal descriptions must become less satisfactory as actual instructions. How do you adequately depict—so that it can be clearly seen at some distance by a handler approaching with her dog— the instruction to halt at the station, sit the dog, ask the dog to remain seated while the handler runs forward several steps, then, while continuing to run forward, to call the dog and when the dog catches up to heel position, the handler steps back and recalls the dog to sit front?

Really? On an 11" x 8-1/2" sign? No. The signs are clearly not meant to instruct,

but simply to remind the handler of how to perform an exercise that is carefully described in the RULES for the venue in question!

So just as you are responsible for knowing the rules about handling food (if permitted) or whether you should enter "A" or "B" classes, you should know how to perform any exercise represented by any sign that may be used at the level and in the venue you are competing in. Then, when you walk the course you will be thinking about how you and your partner will navigate each station and the path from one to the next—not spending time trying to figure out what a given sign means. And when it is your turn to run the course together, you can concentrate on working together as a team to solve the puzzles the course designer has presented to you, not still trying to remember what the various pieces of the puzzle are.

Breed Handling

Vicki Ronchette Breed Handling Workshops: Show Like the Pros!



Vicki Ronchette will be offering two breed handling workshops at PCOTC on October 7-8. Ms. Ronchette is the author of *Positive Training for Show Dogs: Building a Relationship for Success, From Shy to Showy.*

The Saturday workshop, "Shaping Show Dog Superstars," focuses on training a successful show dog. Workshop participants will learn how progressive training methods are used to train the basic show ring behaviors, including gaiting and stacking, as well as problem solving issues associated with the show ring.

Sunday's workshop, "Mastering Your Dog's Movement and Show-Stopping Stacks" is about taking your dog's show ring performance to the next level. This workshop will cover how to train and perfect your dog's movement as well as learning the key points in how to teach a reliable and dynamic stack.

AKC Trick Dog Titles

The American Kennel Club is now offering Trick Dog titles to dogs that have AKC, PAL or AKC Canine Partners numbers. This titling opportunity allows dogs and handlers of all ages and abilities to show off their training skills and earn titles for their efforts.

The AKC is offering titles for the following levels: Novice (TKN), Intermediate (TKI), Advanced (TKA) and Trick Dog Performer (TKP).

For all levels except TKP, the titles may be earned by performing the tricks for an AKC Approved CGC Evaluator. For TKP titles, the dog and handler team must videotape a routine and submit it to AKC.

For teams who are already involved in teaching tricks and have earned titles through the Do More With Your Dog program, AKC will allow grandfathering of existing titles through the end of 2017. Food and toys may be used as training aids at the Novice level, and, in fact, if your dog has its CGC on AKC record, it need only perform five tricks to earn the Novice Trick Dog title! For levels beyond Novice, teams

must perform 5-10 tricks from a list of tricks for each level, and food and toys may not be used.

Checklists for required tricks at each level can be found on AKC's website. Family Manners Training Director Jenn Michaelis filmed many "How To" videos for AKC's YouTube Channel with her dogs, Terra and Ringo, to help promote the program.

Nose Work

Update to Nose Work Trends by Kathy Gregory

I recently attended a seminar where several new twists on what was the usual Nose Work thinking were presented. I am happy to share these with you.

- 1) For a successful Container search, you must have a canine partner with a strong, independent hunting behavior, first. Without this, you have nothing. If you don't have this, go back and foster the dog's primal motivators and step away from overtly involving yourself in the search.
- 2) The value of a short leash while working containers in a small space.

Amy Herot showed several video clips

demonstrating the use of a three-foot leash while navigating a small room packed with many containers. We should all have a variety of leash lengths available to us during a search and be proficient in using them, to efficiently and safely navigate these challenging situations.

3) Teaching one odor at a time is far better than teaching two or three at once.

Our dogs develop fluency with each different odor. Allow them time to linger on each.

4) To not trust your dog when he gives you an indication is an erosion of the rest of the trial.

- 5) Always give a big reward for a dog who leaves trapping odor to go back to source!
- 6) You do not need to train with multiple distracters. You need to believe in your dog.

And lastly, there comes a point in a dog's training where the dog makes a leap in searching and the handler still handles the dog like it is less skilled. Watch for this moment in your own partner and be sure to acknowledge this leap by trusting your dog's intelligence and skills.

Recipes for Dogs and Their Humans

We've heard from dogs and their humans who really liked the food they ate at PCOTC, so we're sharing the recipes!

Dog Treat Recipes from Sara Gagnon

Many dogs praised the dog treats that Sara Gagnon prepared for our April club meeting. Here you go, doggies—your humans can now bake the same treats as Sara!

Strawberry Banana Cookies

- 1 1/2 cup oat flour
- 1 1/2 cup brown rice flour
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp honey
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup strawberries (fresh or frozen, mashed and pureed)
- 1/2 cup bananas (mashed and pureed)
- 1/2 cup water (add slowly)

Bake at 375. Combine all ingredients together except water. Add water slowly and mix until dough forms. Bake 18-25 minutes until golden brown.

Blueberry Bites

- 1 1/2 cup oat flour
- 1 1/2 cup brown rice flour
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup blueberries (fresh or frozen)
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1/2 cup water (add slowly)

Combine all ingredients together except water. Add water slowly and mix until dough forms. Bake at 375 for 18-25 minutes until golden brown.

P.B. Banana Drops

- 1 1/2 cup oat flour
- 1 1/2 cup brown rice flour
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup rolled oats (old fashioned, not instant)
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1/2 cup bananas (mashed and pureed)
- 1/2 cup water (add slowly)

Combine all ingredients together except water. Add water slowly and mix until dough forms. Bake at 375 for 18-25 minutes until golden brown.

AKC Delegate's Report

First Quarter 2017 — by Kathy Gregory, PCOTC's AKC Delegate

The first quarter delegate meeting of 2017 was held during the last winter snowstorm blast of the season, in March. The weather was a real challenge to Delegates traveling from all over the U.S. to vote for future AKC Board members as well as the usual day-to-day business of dog sport procedure.

A survey had been created by the Companion Events Committee to be sent out to a small number of all-breed Performance clubs who had reported they had dropped classic Obedience from their class roster and, for those clubs that did, why they are allowing other, different clubs to offer Obedience at their shows. Discussion revolved around how many clubs the survey should be sent to and how many officers of those clubs should receive them. A vote was taken and passed to move forward with the survey and to have it posted online. The Committee is still trying to put their finger on why some clubs have maintained successful Obedience programs while many have not, and how the AKC can help support this foundation sport that is facing increasing challenges on many fronts.

The AKC Staff reported the following Companion Events Statistics for January 2017 vs 2016:

A report was given on the upcoming Companion Events Nationals in Perry, Georgia. It is the largest entries for all three events in the history of the Championships.

National Agility Championship: 1,397 entries National Obedience Championship: 140 entries Rally National Championship: 400 entries

Hopefully, we will be able to cheer on some PCOTC members at this event!!!

A lengthy discussion on Sits and Downs in Obedience was held. There were very few incidents on Sits and Downs between 2007-2009. It was stated that the recommendations enacted a year and a half ago seemed to have helped, as Novice dogs are allowed to remain leashed, that a four-foot distance be allowed between dogs, and that dogs showing aggression outside the ring be disqualified. Because this issue is so concerning, it will continue to be top-of-mind in all future discussions and will be revisited after the National Obedience Championships. It is possible that additional recommendations will be made at that time, to continue to mitigate concerns surrounding this issue.

Two Obedience & Rally Regulation Changes

Closing of entries. The obedience and rally regulations

were amended to include language for a closing time for entries and the closing time shall be no later than 11:59 p.m. on the third Wednesday prior to the trial for trials held on Friday through Monday. Previously, the regulations governing these sports did not address a closing time for entries, but instead defaulted to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows. Clubs now have the ability to extend the closing hour for their entries at their option following the requirements listed below. If an obedience and/or rally trial is held in conjunction with other club events, the same closing date/time is recommended for all events. This regulation became effective May 1, 2017, and clubs may apply for events with a later closing hour at their option.

Rally Regulations – Chapter 1. Section 3. Premium Lists, Closing of Entries and Catalogs. (Insert as paragraph 2)

Every premium list shall specify the date and time at which entries for a trial shall close. The premium list shall also specify the name and address of the Superintendent or Trial Secretary who is to receive the entries.

For all trials the specified closing date and time must be no later than as outlined in the following schedule:

For a trial which opens on Friday, Saturday, Sunday, or Monday, entries accepted not later than 11:59 p.m. on the third Wednesday prior to the trial.

For a trial which opens on Tuesday, entries accepted not later than 11:59 p.m. on the third Thursday prior to the trial.

For a trial which opens on Wednesday, entries accepted not later than 11:59 p.m. the third Friday prior to the trial.

For a trial which opens on Thursday, entries accepted not later than 11:59 p.m. on the third Wednesday prior to the trial.

Clubs in a cluster of no more than five consecutive days have the option of closing no later than 11:59 p.m. on the third Wednesday prior to the last trial in the cluster.

Whenever the closing day noted above falls on a postal holiday, entries received in any form up to 24 hours from the published closing date and time may be accepted.

Transfer of entries in obedience and rally. The regulations will allow a transfer of an entry from one class to another (rally class to rally class; obedience class to obedience class) at the request of the exhibitor after the closing date for entries, regardless of when the dog earned the title, provided the club allows transfers and only if the class and judge are available. Transfers in both Obedience and Rally were amended and are effective July 1, 2017.

- The club will clearly state in its premium list whether transfers will or will not be allowed. If no statement is provided in the premium list the default is to allow transfers.
- A transfer (i.e., from an obedience class to an obedience class; or a

rally class to a rally class) may be requested if, according to the owner's records the handler and dog are eligible provided the club offers transfers.

- Transfers from an "A" to "B" class at the same level are allowed provided the host club allows transfers. (When a club does not allow transfers, refer to Section 16b. Entry of Ineligible Dog.)
- The request for a transfer must be in writing and presented to the superintendent or trial secretary at least 30 minutes prior to the start of each trial.
- Clubs may choose to accept transfers prior to the day of the trial and this should be clearly stated in the premium list.
- Transfers may be approved provided the class and judge are available, and the class has not reached its limit.

Rally Regulations – Chapter 1, Section 13. Transfers.

- The club will clearly state in its premium list whether transfers will or will not be allowed. If no statement is provided in the premium list the default is to allow transfers.
- A transfer from a rally class to a rally class may be requested if, according to the owner's records the handler and dog are eligible, provided the club offers transfers.
- Transfers from an "A" to "B" class at the

same level are allowed provided the host club allows transfers. (When a club does not allow transfers, refer to Section 14. Entry of Ineligible Dog.)

- The request for a transfer must be in writing and presented to the superintendent or trial secretary at least 30 minutes prior to the start of each trial.
- Clubs may choose to accept transfers prior to the day of the trial and this should be clearly stated in the premium list.

Transfers may be approved provided the class and judge is available, and the class has not reached its limit.

Of special interest to PCOTC member homeowners:

The New York Assembly is expected to vote soon on a bill that would prohibit homeowners insurance providers from refusing or cancelling coverage or increasing premiums based solely on the breed of dog owned by the policy owner.

Assembly Bill 4225 prohibits insurers from refusing to issue, renew or cancel or raise premiums for homeowner's insurance based on breed of dog (or mixed-breed) owned by the policyholder. The bill does allow for insurance companies to take these actions if the dog has been declared dangerous based on current law, so long as these actions are based on "sound underwriting and actuarial"

principles" that are reasonably related to actual or anticipated loss.

New York state law already expressly prohibits municipalities from passing laws that target specific breeds of dogs. AKC supports AB 4225, which would extend these protections to homeowners, while still holding all dog owners accountable, regardless of the breed they choose to own.

The developers of the site as it stands now, gave a presentation recently, apparently completely unaware of the difficulty the users have in navigating the site. Helpful criticism and enthusiastic suggestions were given by the Delegate body at a recent meeting and it was resolved

refrigerate it and then transported it in a crockpot for events. For the club, I tripled the recipe and had a 5-quart pot to slowly heat the chili so it was ready for lunch! Not a spoonful was left over! I often add another can of plain stewed tomatoes and extra beans and corn since I'm not much of a meat eater. Play around with the recipe. You can't go wrong.

Weight Watcher Curried Chicken Salad

Ingredients:

1 pound of grilled chicken breasts cut in strips and chopped. (I cheat and use the already grilled packages from BJ's when in a rush which is about two or three 6-ounce packages)

½ cup diced organic celery 2 tablespoons of fresh squeezed lemon juice

¼ cup of low fat mayo

1 teaspoon of curry powder (more as you like)

1/4 teaspoon of coarsely ground pepper

Combine all ingredients in a large bowl. I usually whisk the dressing ingredients first and add it to the chicken pieces. Stir it all well and place in an airtight container. Chill for at least two hours prior to serving.

For the trial, I quadrupled the recipe and it seemed to be a crowd pleaser. Enjoy!

Book Review: Dog Sports Skills, Book 4: Focus and Engage!



The featured book this quarter is *Dog Sports Skills*, *Book 4: Focus and Engage!*, co-authored by Deb Jones and Denise Fenzi. Denise, founder of Fenzi Dog Sports Academy, has been a seminar guest twice here at PCOTC, to great acclaim. Now you have the opportunity to met Deb Jones. (See Rick Pisani's article, "Get Focused," on page 8)

Focus and Engage! follows the syllabus of the co-presented online courses: Denise Fenzi presented the course on *engagement* and Deb Jones with Judy Keller, focus. Having taken the double course last year, I can honestly attest to the effectiveness of the book *and* the course. The premise is you cannot teach a dog unless the dog is focused on you. No manner of force or attempting to be more enticing than that squirrel running up the tree can make that dog focus on you or engage in what you are doing with him. The authors define focus as the cognitive "ability to concentrate on the task at hand...(to) ignore other competing demands and attend to just one." Focus is the foundation of engagement being "mutual interaction...only possible once your dog has developed the ability to concentrate and focus on you."

How do we get there?

The exercises in Book 4 are progressively challenging, starting with Focus. But first,



the authors discuss categories of focus issues, including stress, fear, environmental curiosity, etc. Once you can identify your own dog's mindset or temperament, you have a better idea of how to work with him. Starting with *Rapid Fire Treats* (feeding the dog ten treats on rapid succession just for being). Continuing through stationary eye contact to moving focus, adding distractions, and removing reinforcers from trainer, next comes focus games.

Engagement takes a bit more work on the trainer's part. Temperament is innate, but, the authors contend, you control it through

the level of skill building and creative reinforcing play. Obviously, for this you start with focus. The book takes the reader through ways of motivating the dog to start and sustain engagement through various exercises, starting with acclimation to the environment. Just giving the dog enough time to check out his surroundings goes a long way to sustain focus, hence, an engaged dog.

I took the online course and it really helped Beamer, my Border collie, who is talented in distraction. The advantage of the book is that it goes into more depth with explanations and definitions, The advantage of the online course is the fully participating Gold Level students submit videos (via YouTube) for a critique of their work for each exercise. These three instructors are remarkable in their timely responses and their in-depth feedback. The obvious advantage of attending Deb's seminar in a working spot is the immediate analysis from the instructor. As an auditor, you have the advantage of observing and learning from the working teams without the distraction of your own dog's care and comfort.

Sadly, Book 4 is the last in the series., but it was one of the most helpful. I highly recommend reading it and practicing the exercises. And I more than highly recommend attending the Deb Jones seminar, whether as a working team or as an auditor!

Spring EventsKamal Fernandez Seminar Review by Richard Pisani

Port Chester Obedience Training Club hosted an obedience seminar given by Kamal Fernandez of East London Dog Training on March 11 & 12.

Kamal is an instructor of the Fenzi Academy as well as a full-time trainer in the UK. There were many club members in attendance with working spots that benefited from Kamal's upbeat and playful style of dog training. The clear message to all participants is that obedience training has to be fun and energizing while being less predictable with the reinforcement. Most trainers rely heavily on food as reinforcement, which can be too predictable and overlook toys and games as reinforcement for the dog.

Day one started with all working teams on the floor for a series of games. "Simon Says" was the first game in which the dogs had to listen and concentrate on the verbal cue rather than rely on physical signals to prompt them. Other games focused on creating a "work is starting" cue and impulse control.

After a brief lecture describing Kamal's heeling method each team got its own chance to try some of the Kamal heel work techniques. Teams who have worked with Kamal through the Fenzi Academy got the chance to problem solve. Day two was a handler's choice in which each team worked on various challenges they were having with Novice, Open or Utility exercises.

The best part of the seminar was watching Kamal train each dog. He was able to get a feel for each dog while demonstrating and giving his expert opinion on the challenges that each team experienced. Having been to many seminars in the past, I felt this was truly a unique and exciting experience. Each working team and auditor came away with new and positive training techniques. Kamal will be returning in March of 2018. If you were unable to attend this last seminar and you want some new and different ideas on how to positively train your dog. I would suggest not missing the next one!

We kicked off the show with a welcoming and encouraging judge's meeting, with all the attending competitors and volunteers. Gay Stahley made everyone feel comfortable and a little less nervous by sharing that she has trained and showed terriers for more than 30 years. "There isn't anything your dog can do in the ring today, that my dogs haven't done to me at some point. Just remember that you are here to have fun."

Both days were filled with terrific, funny, touching and bouncy routines from every level of freestyle. Themes ran the gauntlet from pirates to Star Wars, and from magic acts to Ghostbusters, treating us to every music genre possible: pop, oldies, country, bandstand, soundtracks and world. We watched countless dog-and-handler teams showcase their hidden talents, training, and creativity, as well as their strong relationships with their dogs.

The "That's Entertainment" class was very popular at the end of both days. This class allows competitors the subtle use of treats or toys in the ring, which is advantageous for young dogs or dogs new to the sport. Spectators and competitors alike were



doubly supportive of the teams in this class: Jamie Ohman and Kyu, Nancy Marston and Bea, Kathleen Nurena and Shorty, Chelly Campbell and Bunny, Barbara Del Rowe and Gigi, Kathleen Nurena and Shakespeare. These teams receive scores and judge's comments to help them prepare for titling classes in the future.

Spectators and competitors were also treated to some spectacular champion-level routines. Paula Winsor and her Australian shepherd, Talus, performed an energetic pirate-themed routine complete with cutthroat tactics, jumps and swordplay to the soundtrack from Pirates of the Caribbean. Volunteering Explained

Volunteers run all PCOTC activities except dog training, for which we pay qualified instructors. We ask each club member to volunteer a minimum of 12 hours during each club year (June 1 to May 31). Those who complete the minimum of 12 hours receive special Member Volunteer rates that provide year-round savings on all group classes.

In order to receive the special volunteer rates for a club year, members must complete their volunteer hours prior to the beginning of that club year.

Volunteer hours do not "carry over" from year to year. Each member in a family membership needs credit for 12 volunteer hours, but family members may credit hours to another person in the membership.

New club members must complete 6 volunteer hours prior to submitting their application for membership, and are eligible for the Volunteer Member privileges immediately

upon admission to the club. They then must complete an additional 6 hours prior to the end of the club year to receive Volunteer Member status for the next year.

You can find volunteer opportunities in the Help Wanted column in Sit 'n Stay and on the PCOTC Events bulletin board at the facility or by contacting our Volunteer Coordinator at pcotcvolunteer@gmail.com.

It is your responsibility to report your volunteer hours via a PCOTC Volunteer Reporting Form, kept in stock at the facility. The form is also available for download from the Membership page of our web site, http://www.pcotc.org/membership.

Volunteer members who log in 30+ hours in a club year will be considered "Super Volunteers" who will be honored at the annual club meeting and given a Certificate of Appreciation.

Corresponding Secretary: Non-member people are looking to rent the facility. A discussion ensued and each case will be evaluated separately. The Hudson Valley Golden Retriever Club would like to host a seminar upstairs for Prison Raised Puppies. They are willing to work in the dark week after May. Megan will get back to them.

Nosework would like to have a seminar if space is available.

The results of the recent class survey were 85% positive.

House: Front door needs replacement. The locking mechanism does not work properly. The landlord will be contacted.

Publicity/PR/Website: There are quite a few seminars on the calendar. The web administrator will no longer do website come September. The new website in the process of being designed uses Squarespace and Jane needs to get the username and password access to continue working on it. Training is also important to keep the website up to date.

Jane put out an eblast looking for people from each training area to work with the respective TD on workshops and seminars. She received no replies from instructors and no replies from students.

New Jumps: discussed the need for new jumps in agility since the AKC has created a new one. Obedience does not need additional jumps as there are jumps in the closet that are not being used.

Karen Wray: Sent a recap of the recent Obedience trial with some suggestions for the future. These will be taken under advisement.

Office Employee: The group was tasked with the mission to determine what they would use an office employee for, determine how many hours/day, how many days/week and whether we can afford to add this position. This will be discussed further at the next Board meeting.

Kathy Gregory: will be scheduled next week to talk to the Board about Independent Contractors vs. Employees.

Parking: the club has 4 spots that can be used by instructors and handicapped individuals displaying the handicap sign.

PCOTC Board Meeting Minutes

Fire Safety

- The door in the back of the room downstairs should be changed out to a push bar to make exit easier in case of a fire and bring it up to code.
- There should be no storage of any kind within 3 feet of the electrical panel in the supply room.
- The sump pump in the supply room should have a metal grate over it.
- Carbon Dioxide extinquishers should be hung and marked in the supply closet.
- A Dry Chem Extinquisher is needed to be hung and marked upstairs and inspected.
- The second floor's emergency lighting needs to be upgraded. The landlord will be contacted to determine if this is his responsibility or ours.
- Exit signs need to be upgraded to the light-up kind.
- Each area needs a diagram of fire exit and plan for safe evacuation.
- The fire department has suggested a "knock box" which would contain a key and code for the fire department to get in the building in case of a fire. This is estimated to cost between \$250-\$400.
- It is recommended that our current water fire extinquishers be changed out for A/B/C extinquishers which will cover all types of fires.

• This is happening Thursday during the dark week.

Rally

- There is no Chairperson and day of Secretary for the July rally trials. Application have been submitted and approved and the judge; Nancy Withers has already been contracted.
- Jeanne will reach out again to find a chair and day of secretary otherwise there will not be any rally trials going forward.
- The club needs another rally instructor. Jeanne will reach out to the contact given to Rick.

Agility
